

The Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education (ACPE) was created by the Alaska Legislature in **1974** to centralize planning for higher education and administer financial aid programs.

In 1987, the Legislature established the Alaska Student Loan Corporation (ASLC), which funds the Commission's programs and services. The Board of Directors with the Alaska Postsecondary Access & Completion Network (AlaskaCAN)



announced a pause on all official, external AlaskaCAN activities, including monthly Board of Director meetings, annual Board of Directors elections, as well as the Annual AlaskaCAN! Conference. During this time, the AlaskaCAN Governance Committee's efforts are focused on securing sustainable funding for AlaskaCAN and creating a full-time AlaskaCAN staff position.

Since its inception, AlaskaCAN's all-volunteer Board of Directors worked to develop strategic partnerships, build awareness, and be Alaska's trusted and valued convener of education and workforce partnerships. Though the organization's progress has been significant, to better position AlaskaCAN towards reaching its goals, it is imperative to shift our organizational model from an all-volunteer Board to one that includes full-time staff.




College Preparation

Just above one fourth of Alaska's high school Class of 2025 tested proficient in English language arts (ELA); only one fifth tested proficient in math | Exhibit 1. Alaska Performance Scholarship eligibility and award use for Class of 2023 is summarized in Exhibit 2.



2024 APS Outcomes Report

2023 eligibility rates continued the trend of 2022, with another year at 17% (the lowest eligibility rate since the program's inception).

However, award use is rising, with Class of 2023 APS eligible high school graduates using the award at a rate of 33%.



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2022 High School Graduates Eligible for the APS Award



Standardized **Testing**

Alaska's participation in national standardized testing increased for graduating high school Class of 2023. The state of Alaska *ACT participation was* **15%**, up from 14% in 2022 | **Exhibit 3**. *SAT participation was* **30%**, up from 26% in 2022 | **Exhibit 4**. Alaska's percent meeting benchmark by subject for SAT and ACT is slightly higher than national averages (benchmark scores represent a 75% chance of a student achieving at least a C grade in a first-semester, credit-bearing college course). *ACT.org* | *CollegeBoard*



When compared to states with similar ACT participation rates, Alaska's score (**20.2**) ranked among the lowest. Similar states (*12-16% participation rates*) were Illinois (**24.5**), Idaho (**23.0**), Oregon (**20.9**), and New Mexico (**20.2**). ACT.org







SAT Testing, Alaska vs. National | High School Class of 2023:

When compared to states with similar SAT participation rates, Alaska's score (**1,082**) ranked lowest. Similar states (*24-30% participation rates*) were North Carolina (**1,127**), Oregon (**1,125**), Hawaii (**1,114**), and California (**1,083**). *CollegeBoard*





High School **Graduation Rates**

The 2019-20 National Adjusted Cohort Graduation Rate (ACGR) for public high school students was 87%. Alaska's rate for 2019-20 was 79%, ranking 46th* in the US (ahead of Arizona and New Mexico, and behind Oklahoma). 



Proportion of Alaska high school graduates enrolling in-state vs. out-of-state: In-state enrollments for Class of 2023 increased to **52%**, and out-of-state enrollments dropped to **48%**. These rates are a reversal in the trend over the last few years where out-of-state enrollments surpassed in-state enrollments following the COVID pandemic. NSC









Alaska Postsecondary Enrollment Trends

Alaska enrollments declined in 2022 by 1,800 students.

In 2023, there was a *positive change* in Alaska first-time freshmen enrollments for both 2-year and 4-year institutions. This was a shift for 2-year Alaska institutions from the previous year, which had a **-14%** decline in 2022 | **Exhibit 13**.

12-month enrollment totals for AY2022 (undergraduate and graduate enrollments) continued to decline, with **1,800 fewer students** at Alaska postsecondary institutions in AY2022 compared with AY2021 | **Exhibit 14-16**. A comparison of fall 2020-2022 Alaska enrollments by institution are given in **Exhibit 17**.


Percent change of first-time freshmen postsecondary enrollments during 2022 and 2023, 2-year vs. 4-year institutions.












Male and female breakdown of Alaska education credentials (2022AY). IPEDS






Male vs. Female Enrollments















Low-income College Participation







Federal Aid Programs

Pell Grant

Primarily designed to support undergraduate students, the federal Pell Grant program awards aid to students with exceptional financial need. Award amounts change yearly and are determined based on need, cost of attendance, and enrollment type; for the 2023-2024 award year, the maximum Pell Grant award was *\$7,395*.

Work-study Jobs

The federal work-study program provides part-time work for undergraduate and graduate students with financial need during their time enrolled in school.

Subsidized and Unsubsidized Loans

These federal loan programs support students at colleges, universities, community colleges, and career or technical schools. Subsidized loans are for undergraduate students with financial need, and unsubsidized loans are for either undergraduates or graduate students and do not require the student to demonstrate financial need.

PLUS Loans

The PLUS loan program supports eligible parents and graduate or professional students to cover costs at participating postsecondary institutions.

State Aid Programs

ACPE administers the following programs: APS, AEG, ASEL, FEL, & REFI



Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS)

The Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS) provides an opportunity for Alaska high school graduates to earn *up to \$4,755 per year* towards their postsecondary education costs. Alaska residents graduating from an Alaska high school earn the scholarship by taking rigorous curriculum, getting good grades, and scoring well on qualifying college placement or work-ready exams. Recipients can use the scholarship at eligible Alaska institutions for up to four years of study.



Alaska Education Grant (AEG)

The Alaska Education Grant (AEG) provides needs-based financial assistance to Alaska students attending qualifying postsecondary educational institutions in Alaska. Grant awards range from \$500 to \$4,000 per academic year.

Awards are prioritized based on financial need, continuing full-time enrollment, and application date for the Free Application for Federal

Student Aid (FAFSA).

Alaska Supplemental Education Loan (ASEL)

The Alaska Supplemental Education loan (ASEL) provides low-cost loans to Alaska college or career training students. Students can choose to defer payments while enrolled in school at least half-time, or make fixed monthly payments of \$50 per loan while enrolled in school at least half-time, and receive a lower interest rate.

Alaska Family Education Loan (FEL)

The Family Education Loan (FEL) is a low-cost state loan option for family members supporting a student's postsecondary education. Parents, spouses, and grandparents can take out a loan on behalf of the student.

Students need to know about their state financial aid options, otherwise students may decide it is too expensive to attend college or training.

Alaska Refinance Loan (REFI)

The Alaska Refinance Loan (REFI) is Alaska's education loan debt solution. With Alaska's REFI loan, eligible borrowers can consolidate student loan debt from any lender, including federal and private loans, to reduce the costs of repayment.


UA Scholars

The UA Scholars award is a \$12,000 scholarship provided to the top ten percent of all graduating seniors from Alaska high schools and can be



used at any of the University of Alaska (UA) campuses. It provides an incentive for

Alaska's middle and high school students to achieve academic excellence, and it is designed to nourish efforts of schools to provide high quality education and encourage top Alaska high school graduates to attend UA. The UA Scholars Program is administered by the University of Alaska and is funded through its Land Grant Endowment.

ACPE (Alaska State) Education Loans

The cost burden of pursuing postsecondary education continues to rise. This impacts students in Alaska and nationwide as they consider pursuing their education and career goals after high school. As a result, students end up taking on more student loans to continue with their education. During the 2021-22 academic year, \$13 billion was taken out in private student loans.⁴

Student loans are often pursued when there is a financial gap to be bridged between a student's federal and institutional aid package and the remaining cost of attendance. This gap has increased for many years. ACPE's education loans are structured to bridge that gap (**Exhibit 46**). With built-in safeguards to minimize borrowing more than a student needs, students save anywhere from \$3,300 - \$15,400 with ACPE education loans than with other private lenders.

ACPE provides high-quality, low-cost education loan solutions to increase persistence and attainment of postsecondary education credentials. This, in turn helps build a stronger, educated, trained workforce to support the demands of the Alaskan economy.

It is important to emphasize the difference between ACPE education loans and for-profit private loans. Unlike for-profit private lenders, ACPE loans do not offer teaser rates. Meaning, our loans do not offer a very low interest rate that is nearly impossible to receive for most borrowers. Our rates are clearly displayed from the start. ACPE loans are offered at a fixed rate. This means our students do not have to worry about their payment changing from month to month, year to year. ACPE education loans do not include fees

ACPE is committed to providing our students with the education finance solutions needed to pursue and attain their educational goals. ACPE remains responsive to the needs of our students, the State of Alaska, the postsecondary institutions across our state, and future needs of Alaska's workforce.

ACPE Grants & Scholarships

Nationwide, *\$12 billion per year* is invested through financial aid programs to support 4.5 million students.⁶ Alaska's two largest financial aid programs — the Alaska Education Grant (AEG) and the Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS) — are administered by ACPE.

With historically low rates of FAFSA completion, Alaska's students lose access to critical funding sources to support postsecondary education and workforce needs. The impact of not completing the FAFSA is extensive. By not completing the FAFSA, students' access to education funding sources is limited. Without these funds, many Alaskans do not pursue education or career training, resulting in a reduction of workforce-prepared Alaskans and less future income.

By completing the FAFSA, Alaskans gain access to education and career training opportunities and ultimately, the enhanced capacity to positively impact their lives and the lives of their families.

In 2023, Federal Student Aid (FSA) worked towards implementing sweeping changes to the FAFSA for the 2024-25 school year. These changes include updated application questions, financial need calculations, as well as the FAFSA platform itself. As a result, there was a delayed release of the 2024-25 FAFSA from October 1, 2023 to a mid-December 2023 soft launch period.



The Alaska **FAFSA** Summit

Leading up to the release of the 2024-25 FAFSA.

ACPE hosted the first-ever in-person Alaska FAFSA Summit, with support from the University of Alaska. Bringing together over 120 education stakeholders, the goal of the Alaska FAFSA Summit was to develop strategies to increase FAFSA completion through statewide initiatives and/or policies. FAFSA Summit attendees Alaska-wide representation from: secondary administrators, teachers,

and counselors; postsecondary administrators, Alaska Native Education Foundations, Alaska Native Corporations, and the State of Alaska

The Alaska FAFSA Summit hosted highly regarded speakers and panelists from Alaska and the Lower 48, representing organizations including: State of Alaska Legislature, Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development, Alaska Department of Education and Early Development, the National College Attainment Network, and the Louisiana Office of Student Financial Aid.

Through the Summit's collaborative efforts, participants identified challenges and barriers to FAFSA completion statewide, initiated a goal to create a resource for statewide distribution regarding student Special Circumstances leading to Independent Student Status, and identified a collective statewide FAFSA completion campaign.

Despite this disparity, APS use by Alaska Native/America Indian students *increased 2.5 times* between the Class of 2022 and 2023.





APS's Future: **Student Insights**



The APS has helped retain educated & skilled Alaskans as contributors to the Alaskan economy

for over a decade. Despite the award's benefits, APS usage has declined. This decline prompted ACPE to connect with Alaska's APS-eligible and ineligible high school graduates to identify APS barriers and the solutions needed to make APS relevant for future Alaskans.


