The Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education (ACPE) was created by the Alaska Legislature in **1974** to centralize planning for higher education and administer financial aid programs.

In 1987, the Legislature established the **Alaska Student Loan Corporation (ASLC)**, which funds the Commission's programs and services. The following responsibilities and authorities, established in law, frame the Commission's overarching mission to **provide** sustainable solutions for college, career and technical training:

- Supports the growth & development of postsecondary programs
- Assesses educational outcomes
- Administers financial aid programs & interstate education compact programs
- Advises on consortia and cooperative agreements among Alaska postsecondary institutions
 - Regulates & ensures compliance of postsecondary institutions as the state agency required by federal higher education law

Not only are ACPE education loans resulting in savings for Alaskans, but they also offer safeguards from over-borrowing. To reduce the potential of borrowing more than the student needs, ACPE works with institutions and training providers to ensure students meet enrollment guidelines, remain in good academic standing, and loans do not exceed the cost of attendance. Transparency is also a priority for ACPE and our loans reflect that.

ACPE provides high-quality, low-cost education loan solutions to increase persistence and attainment of postsecondary education credentials. This in turn helps build a stronger, educated, trained workforce to support the demands of the Alaskan economy.

ACPE's State Grant & Scholarship

Solutions

Supporting access to postsecondary funding solutions for Alaska students is a priority for ACPE. As the administrator of Alaska's grant and scholarship programs, ACPE works with students and families, schools, districts, postsecondary institutions, and state agencies to inform, advocate, and enhance access.

Currently, Alaska students may be eligible to receive the Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS) and the Alaska Education Grant (AEG), which are the State's grant and scholarship programs.

Both programs require completion of the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) and to meet programspecific eligibility requirements. The AEG is the needs-based grant program as determined by the student's Student Aid Index (SAI) from the FAFSA. In accordance with other awarding stipulations, AEGeligible students may receive \$500-\$4,000 per academic year through the AEG. (For more information on AEG, see page 24).

APS, Alaska's merit-based scholarship, underwent substantial changes effective for the Class of 2024 and beyond. Ultimately, the goal of APS and the recent legislative changes is to increase access to and utilization of the Alaska Performance Scholarship after years of decline.

Although long term outcomes of these legislative changes are not yet available, in the short term the results are already promising. Since the passage of APS legislation HB148 in June 2024, the APS program has seen the largest number of APS eligible graduates, highest percent eligibility of a graduating class, the most Award Level 1 eligible students, and the greatest amount awarded to date.

ACPE is encouraged by these promising results and how these legislative changes to APS have long-lasting, positive impacts on postsecondary education and workforce in Alaska. (For more information on APS, see page 24).

ACPE's FAFSA Solutions: Myth Busting

FAFSA completion is an essential step for college and career training. ACPE offers various types of FAFSA completion support for all Alaskans. Historically, Alaska ranks

Through this Initiative, ACPE delivers Master the FAFSA Trainings, FAFSA completion events, one-on-one and small group completion activities, and more. ACPE also offers self-quided tutorials for FAFSA completion available on the AFCI website for all to access, including step-by-step instructions for StudentAid.Gov Account creation. Troubleshooting Account access, and FAFSA Line By Line completion.

Providing guidance on how to complete the FAFSA is only one component of increasing FAFSA completion rates in Alaska. Another component is myth busting! A great deal of misinformation and/or outdated information still circulates about FAFSA.

ACPE wants to ensure accurate information is available to all Alaskans about the FAFSA.

MYTH: FAFSA is only for loans

TRUTH: FAFSA unlocks many forms of financial aid for college or career training in addition to loans such as grants, scholarships, and work-study.

MYTH: Families can make too much money

TRUTH: There is no income limit for the FAFSA. Institutional and other financial aid that is not need-based (like scholarships) may still require the FAFSA.

MYTH: Last year's taxes haven't been filed yet

TRUTH: FAFSA uses the Prior-Prior Year's tax information meaning for the 25-26 FAFSA, 2023 taxes are used NOT 2024 taxes.

MYTH: FAFSA takes too long to fill out

TRUTH: With the updated FAFSA, new applications can be completed in as little as 30 minutes with FAFSA renewals taking under 10 minutes.

College Preparation

Over the last three years, Alaska's high school proficiency in English language arts (ELA) has remained relatively steady (28% to 31%). Mathematics proficiency rose to 27% for Class of 2026, but dropped to 18% for Class of 2027. Those testing proficient in science dropped from 37% to 30% from Class of 2024-2026 | Exhibit 1. Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS) eligibility and award use for Class of 2024 is summarized in Exhibit 2.

XHIBIT 1

Alaska System of Academic Readiness (AK STAR):

31% of high school Class of 2027 (9th graders tested 2023-24) were advanced or proficient in English language arts (ELA). **18%** were advanced or proficient in mathematics.

Alaska Science Assessment:

30% of high school Class of 2026 (10th graders tested 2023-24) were proficient in science.






Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS), Class of 2022-2024 eligibility and use.


2025 APS Outcomes Report



With the implementation of APS program changes, Class of 2024 eligibility rates rose to 45% (the highest eligibility rate since the program's inception).



Due to the marked increase in eligible students, the rate of award use for Class of 2024 dropped to 22%. However, the number of APS eligible high school graduates using the award nearly doubled from 2023.



96% of APS recipients used the award for collegiate studies: 4% of APS use went to career and technical education programs in 2024.

Standardized **Testing**

For graduating high school Class of 2024, Alaska's participation in national standardized ACT testing decreased from 15% to 13% in 2024 | Exhibit 3. Alaska's SAT testing increased from 30% to 32% in 2024 | Exhibit 4. Alaska's percent meeting benchmark by subject for ACT and SAT remains slightly above national averages. ACT.org | CollegeBoard

High School Class of 2024: Compared to states with similar ACT participation rates, Alaska ranked the lowest (composite score of **19.9**). Composite scores of states that share similar participation rates to Alaska (ranging from 10-14%) were Idaho (23.3), New Mexico (20.0), Oregon (21.1), and Illinois (24.5). ACT.org

The 2021-22 National Adjusted Cohort Graduation Rate (ACGR) for public high school students nationwide was 87%. Comparatively, Alaska's ACGR was 78%, ranking 47th* in the US (ahead of Arizona and behind Idaho).











Alaska high school graduate enrollments: Less than four in ten Class of 2024 high school graduates were enrolled in postsecondary education within a year following high school graduation. NSC



Alaska high school graduates enrolling in-state vs. out-of-state: The proportion of in-state enrollments increased for Class of 2024 to 53% (out-of-state enrollments dropping to 46%). These rates continue the reversing trend where out-of-state enrollments surpassed in-state enrollments following the COVID pandemic from 2020-22. NSC


NUMBER OF STUDENTS Enrolled Out-of-State Through WUE



Alaska Postsecondary **Enrollment Trends**

Alaska enrollments increased for the first time in 10 years (AY23, IPEDS)

Change in 2-year and 4-year first-time freshmen enrollments at Alaska institutions are shown in **Exhibit 13**. Undergraduate enrollments (12-month) rose for the first time in a decade in academic year (AY) 2023 | Exhibit 14.

12-month graduate program enrollments declined in AY2023 | Exhibit 15. However, there has been a slowing rate of decline, with a combined loss of 235 enrollments over the past three years. In contrast, there were **170-340** fewer enrollments *per year* from 2014 to 2020 | Exhibit 15.







Alaska Credentials


A total of **3,791** education credentials were awarded in 2023 at Alaska postsecondary institutions. The most numerous were *Bachelor's degrees* (**38%**) followed by *Certificates* (**27%**). From 2017 to 2023, the number of credentials earned in Alaska has declined, particularly for Bachelor's (**551 fewer**) and Associate's (**575 fewer**) degrees | **Exhibit 20**. Women received **63%** of all credentials in 2023 | **Exhibit 21**.


Alaska Native/American Indian students held **10%** of all credentials, with *nearly half certificates* | Exhibit 22. Additionally, *Alaska Native women hold* 2.6 times the amount of awards as Alaska Native men | Exhibit 22. The top five Bachelor's disciplines awarded in Alaska are shown in Exhibit 23.









Full-time vs. Part-time Enrollments (Class of 2024): High school graduate postsecondary enrollments. IPEDS, NSC
















Federal Financial Aid Programs

Pell Grant

Primarily designed to support undergraduate students, the federal Pell Grant program awards aid to students with exceptional financial need. Award amounts change yearly and are determined based on need, cost of attendance, and enrollment type; for the 2024-2025 award year, the maximum Pell Grant award was \$7.395.

Work-study Jobs

The federal work-study program provides part-time work for undergraduate and graduate students with financial need during their time enrolled in school.

Subsidized and Unsubsidized Loans

These federal loan programs support students at colleges, universities, community colleges, and career or technical schools. Subsidized loans are for undergraduate students with financial need, and unsubsidized loans are for either undergraduates or graduate students and do not require the student to demonstrate financial need.

PLUS Loans

The PLUS loan program supports eligible parents and graduate or professional students to cover costs at participating postsecondary institutions.

State Financial Aid Programs -

ACPE administers the following programs: APS, AEG, ASEL, FEL, & REFI



Alaska Performance Scholarship (APS)

The Alaska Performance
Scholarship (APS) provides an opportunity for Alaska high school graduates to earn **up to \$7,000 per year** towards their postsecondary education costs.
Alaska residents graduating from an Alaska high school earn the scholarship by completing a rigorous high school curriculum and meeting either minimum GPA or test score requirements.
Recipients can use the scholarship at eligible Alaska institutions for up to four years of study.



Alaska Education Grant (AEG)

The Alaska Education Grant (AEG) provides needs-based financial assistance to Alaska students attending eligible postsecondary educational institutions in Alaska. Grant awards range from \$500

to \$4,000 per academic year.

Awards are prioritized based on financial need, application date for the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), and continuing full-time enrollment.

Alaska Supplemental Education Loan (ASEL)

The Alaska Supplemental Education loan (ASEL) provides low-cost loans to Alaska college or career training students, and can be used in and out of state. Students can choose to defer payments while enrolled in school at least half-time, or make fixed monthly payments of \$20 per loan while enrolled in school at least half-time, and receive a lower interest rate.

Alaska Family Education Loan (FEL)

The Family Education Loan (FEL) is a low-cost state loan option for family members supporting a student's postsecondary education, and can be used in and out of state. Parents, spouses, and grandparents can take out a loan on behalf of the student.

Students need to know about their state financial aid options, otherwise students may decide it is too expensive to attend college or career training.

Alaska Refinance Loan (REFI)

The Alaska Refinance Loan (REFI) is Alaska's education loan debt solution. With Alaska's REFI loan, eligible borrowers can consolidate student loan debt from any lender, including federal and private loans, to reduce the costs of repayment.


UA Scholars

The UA Scholars award is a \$15,000 scholarship provided to the top ten percent of all graduating seniors from Alaska high schools and can be



used at any of the University of Alaska (UA) campuses. It provides an incentive for

Alaska's middle and high school students to achieve academic excellence, and it is designed to nourish efforts of schools to provide high quality education and encourage top Alaska high school graduates to attend UA. The UA Scholars Program is administered by the University of Alaska and is funded through its Land Grant Endowment.


